


St. Elisabeth's Episcopal Church

The Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost

October 27, 2024 10:00 AM

Welcome to Saint Elisabeth's. We are delighted to have you with us today.



This faith community invites all persons to all levels of participation, leadership and decision-making within the church regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity, race, ethnicity, age, physical or mental capacity, education, socioeconomic and marital status. We seek to establish meaningful connections with one another through work and play and worship as we strive to understand God's purpose for us in the church and in the world.

Ordinary Time: Creation

The Season after Pentecost is not actually a season with a single common focus, but is simply the weeks between the Day of Pentecost and the First Sunday of Advent. It is often called "Ordinary Time." These weeks hold both the slower pace and peaceful quality of summer months and the quicker pace and flurry of activity in the early fall. These are our "ordinary" days, in which we live the Christian faith in our daily lives.

During these weeks, as the liturgical scholar Leonel Mitchell puts it, we celebrate "the time in which we actually live — the period between the Pentecost and the Second Advent." Two thousand years after the first Pentecost, the church still lives in this "in between" time before the fulfillment of time in Christ's second coming. You might also hear these weeks called "the long, green season," referring both to the green color of the vestments and altar hangings for these weeks as well as to the summertime of year in which many of the weeks fall in the northern hemisphere.

After Pentecost we settle into the growing season, nourishing the seeds planted at Easter and putting down roots in our faith.



for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn.



The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.







Living in Community

The Feast of All Saints - Sunday, November 3

Next Sunday, we will celebrate the Feast of All Saints at each of our services. In our Baptismal Covenant we, along with Christians around the globe, profess in the ancient Baptismal Creed the words: "I believe in . . . the communion of saints . . . the resurrection of

the body, and life everlasting." Here are some special ways to worship and pray and commemorate this day when we honor our dead.

- Write the names of loved ones who have died in the Necrology binder at the back of the church. Necrology means list of deaths; the names of those persons you have shared in the binder will be read aloud during the services on November 3.
- Bring a photo, memento, candle or a personal item to put on our remembrance table
 to recognize the presence of your beloveds among us, commemorating those who
 have died. You can bring them in the week of October 28 during our normal church
 office hours (Tuesday-Thursday, 9-12 noon) or place them on the table when
 heading into the service on November 3.

Forum on Overcoming Racism - Sunday, November 10

Please join Carla Arnell, Robert Fischer, and the Rector on Sunday, November 10th at the regular Sunday Forum after the 10 AM service to begin our congregation's exploration of how we can join together as a community to pursue thoughtful anti-racist work.

The topic of discussion will be an Atlantic Monthly article on Chloé Valdary's approach to anti-racism and how her approach might inform our own programming and work. A copy of the article is linked in the E-News, or you may find hard copies in the back of the church.

We hope that a discussion of this article will be an opportunity for you to share ideas about what St. Elisabeth's anti-racism programming might look like in future months and years. This forum is the first step in St. Elisabeth's response to an important diocesan mandate. Namely, the 2022 Diocesan Convention "call[ed] on all congregations in the diocese to take specific steps to overcome racism and build the antiracist identity of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, in fulfillment of our Baptismal covenant to seek and serve Christ in all persons, strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being." One of the recommended components of this mandate is for each congregation to develop its own antiracism program.
